About the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics Rhode Island

Law Enforcement Torch Run® for Special Olympics (LETR) is a volunteer movement that was established by members of the law enforcement community to support Special Olympics. In Rhode Island, the movement includes law enforcement, corrections, fire, and justice departments. The LETR mission statement is to increase public awareness and raise funds for the Special Olympics movement worldwide.

LETR began in 1981, when Wichita, Kansas (USA) Police Chief Richard LaMunyon saw an urgent need to increase awareness of Special Olympics. He also saw it as an ideal way to get local law enforcement personnel involved with the Special Olympics community. The LETR was quickly adopted by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), the Founding organization of the Law Enforcement Torch Run® for Special Olympics. What started as a flicker more than 40 years ago has grown into a roaring flame of support and stability for Special Olympics athletes worldwide.
